- Use Taekwon-Do as a tool to reinforce health, discipline, and social involvement








UPCOMING YOUTH EXCHANGE: AUGUST 2025

What about the town?





Obzor is a small seaside town on the border between the Burgas and Varna regions, set in a gulf stretching from Cape St. Atanas to the Emin Mountain. Known for its long sandy beach and relaxed atmosphere, it combines sea and mountain scenery, making it a popular summer destination. The resort

lies on a scenic road connecting the

northern and southern Black Sea coast.





ACCOMMODATION

Participants will be accommodated in a local hotel in Obzor, close to the Black Sea coast, with three meals a day and regular coffee breaks provided.

The Chavdar International Sports Center is situated 1.5 km from Obzor and just **150 meters from the sea**, within a lush 70-decare park.

It offers four hotel buildings with capacity for up to 400 guests, each room featuring a bathroom, 1–4 beds, and air conditioning.

Amenities include a restaurant with terrace, disco area, club rooms, medical office, buffet, luggage storage, safe, and free Wi-Fi. The sports facilities range from a pool, football, basketball, and volleyball courts to outdoor fitness, billiards, table tennis, a sports hall, and a stage.

The center's **private beach**, 120 meters away, provides umbrellas, a lifeguard, and areas for activities and entertainment.

WHAT ELSE SHOULD YOU KNOW?

- Obzor is 65 km from Burgas Airport and 70 km from Varna Airport.
- The official currency is the Bulgarian Lev (BGN) with a fixed exchange rate of 1 € = 1.95583 BGN.







WHAT ELSE SHOULD YOU KNOW?

In Bulgaria, drive on the right and overtake from the left. Always wear a seatbelt and keep headlights on at all times. A vignette sticker is required outside cities and can be purchased online at bgtoll.bg.

Speed limits are 50 km/h in cities, 90 km/h outside cities, 120 km/h on automobile roads, and 140 km/h on highways unless otherwise indicated.
